Review: Last Year's (2018-2019) Aims and Outcomes

Aim	Outcome
The gap in performance between disadvantaged student and non-PP students to be reduced. For all students to be progressing in line with their peers nationally.	Not Achieved (P8 gap of 0.57). One student, who didn't attend school during Year 10 and 11 skewed the data. Taking this student out of the cohort the progress 8 gap between PP and all students was 0.38. We aim to reduce this further. In 2019, 12 students out of the cohort of 20 attained positive scores, with 3 students attaining a score above 1.

Curriculum - reviewed open bucket provision for lower ability and low ability PP students to ensure lower attainment at KS2 does not impact negatively on curriculum choices of PP students	Achieved
Leadership – PP a Key priority in the school and PP Leads take responsibility for the monitoring and adapting of strategies to address underachievement	Achieved
Increased attendance for PP students and to reduce the % of PA in the PP group. Particularly for students with mental health issues.	Not achieved. In May 2019 the whole school attendance was 95.0%. PP attendance was 91.0%. A gap of 4.0%. 11.22% of the school have absence less than 90% (PA). 26.67% of PP students have an absence below 90%. This is a key target to work on.
Low level behaviour issues addressed. Students to develop higher aspirations and self-belief to increase commitment to studies.	Achieved. Behaviour in school is very good. The percentage of all students with fixed term exclusions has gone from 4.6% in 2017-2018, to 2.2% in 2018-2019.
To increase the opportunities available to PP students to enrich the educational experience and raise aspirations	Achieved. Sporting and Performing Art experiences. University trips. Prefects. Trips. PP attendance actively encouraged. PP % Allocation reserved.
Increase parental engagement	Not achieved The PP percentage attendance at parents evening is below that of non-PP. This is more significant in some years. Alternative methods of engagement are being sort – use of text messages and phone calls.
To support disadvantaged students with fundamental needs	Achieved. PP student help given with books, trips, uniform, personal products, stationary. Help is provided when it is needed.
